## School Council News

It has been a packed month for the Council, with the passing of the indicative school budget for 2020 being the main focus of the November meeting. Importantly, the Council agreed on a mechanism to ensure that the Council discussions that were had around budget issues from this year, would feed into the mid-term review of the budget in 2020. In practice this means creating a list of future budget suggestions and comments, using data and feedback regarding budget inclusions so that this can be revisited in July each year, prior to the next year's budget development process.

There was discussion around the new mobile phone policy that has been mandated by the Department of Education to commence in 2020. One large change with this policy is that smart watches are also included, so - along with phones and tablets – these must be put away when students get to school and not taken out until school has well finished. More information on the practical implications of this will be shared by the school.

The Council was provided with an update on the maintenance of the girls' toilets and the removal of the partitions which like most old toilet blocks would pose an asbestos risk if broken. Although a low risk, the partitions were replaced over the weekend by the DET and this is now resolved.

A large discussion in the meeting centred on the results from the students Attitude to School Survey. This is a data gathering process facilitated through the Education Department that surveys all children in Years 4, 5 & 6. And the Parent Opinion survey which surveys a random sample of SKiPPS Families – at our school roughly 100 families.



Analysis of the results of the surveys showed that the Parent opinion survey remains positive but that the students attitude survey is showing 3 year negative trending. The teaching staff are intending to conduct a number of focus groups with students to better understand some of the survey findings. Additionally council are hoping to provide opportunities for families to also take part in parent focus groups to explore some of what the children are saying. As this data is further reviewed the Council and teaching staff will learn more about the challenges and strengths of the learning environment at SKiPPS and ensure the Annual Implementation Plan reflects actions toward improvement.

In order to prepare the Annual Implementation Plan for 2020, the leadership team of the school will reflect with staff on goals and present a draft AIP at the December Council meeting. It will then be submitted to the Education Department and returned to council for sign off at our final meeting in February. At this point, December is the last council meeting for the year after which the councillors will share dinner and reflect on what learnings and improvements, we can bring to 2020.

Have a lovely end to the year.

## School Council President's report

In addition to Kathryn's update there are a few other extra council activities to add for this month. Firstly, I would like to thank all members of the school council who have gone above and beyond over the last 2 months putting in two very long nights at the October and November meetings and then doing considerable work outside of meetings as well. This effort ensured decisions were able to be made in a timely way to support the school.



In the past month a letter has been sent on behalf of council to the State Government, the City of Port Phillip and appropriate regulatory authorities to highlight issues with road safety at the

Canterbury Rd crossing. Cars regularly speed along this road and often fail to stop at lights. We have asked that a 40km zone be considered even though the road does not technically border the school. Additionally, that barriers be considered to slow children down as they scoot, ride, run toward the crossing. We will keep you updated on the progress.

The second letter was a letter to local MP Martin Foley to ensure that the plans for redevelopment of school road and the carpark were funded and underway. For those unaware the school carpark and behaviour of drivers poses a very real and daily threat to safety of children being dropped and picked up at school.

This is not only because some drivers disregard road rules but the narrow roadway exacerbates the issue causing blocks to vehicle flow. Minister Foley has met with Environment Minister and Education Minister last week and has been assured the school will have an agreement in place by years end. This issue been a long standing and there are many stakeholders involved so much lobbying has gone on over the years.

Prior councils and especially Mette Aiken-Peterson should be thanked for the considerable time and effort they have spent looking into the issue, reviewing data and meeting stakeholders. Let's hope this time we get a result that means risk is reduced.

The working bee held on Saturday was a great success and again a testament to the community who continue to put in great effort to improve the school environment. Particular thanks to the Buildings and Grounds subcommittee for their effort in planning and implementation. Also, to the teaching staff who came along and helped. We are considerably lucky to have a dedicated team at SKIPPS who not only teach but support and encourage our children in many ways.

Finally, the contract with the new Out of School Hours provider Their Care has been signed. A couple of parents have asked what the process was that led to the new contract. As mentioned in the last newsletter, 2019 saw the term of the contract of the previous provider - OSH Club - due to finish. Council commenced a process early in the year to explore options for the continued provision of before and after school care. This involved establishing a working group, developing a criterion for an EOI process and a matrix for fair and transparent review of each application. The decision on who to choose was a considerably difficult one and as with a number of decisions was decided through a voting majority and then unanimously supported.



Further to that Council determined the fee structure was to remain the same but be fixed for 3 years. This contract provides considerable funds to the school which are channelled back to the programs we run for the children. We believe that the service we receive from the new provider will be substantially different and be value for money. The council voted to delegate management of the

provider to Neil and he is working with them to transition. Their Care will also be required to provide regular reports on performance to Council and this information will be passed on the community.

# Principal's Report

## School Fees

At School Council last week we confirmed the Essential Student Learning Items Fee for families for 2020. This fee is to provide class requisites (stationery, texts books,



equipment etc) for your child to use daily in the classroom alongside all excursions, incursions and materials to participate in other programs (such as our Kitchen Garden program) It is compulsory that all families make this payment.

Our proposed Essential Student Learning Items Fees in 2020 will be:

Foundation	\$445
Year 1/2	\$435
Year 3/4	\$575
Year 5/6	\$540

These totals represent a reduction in fees from 2019 and reflect a willingness to find savings for our SKiPPS families. Further details and family statements will be sent home to families in February.

## Language of Learning Home Learning Task

I have been so impressed by the glimpses we have been able to have into the ongoing and in-depth whole-school Home Learning Task that is currently drawing to a close.

Since the middle of last term, we have asked a lot of our students in exploring the idea of 'Comfort Zone' and challenge. The level of thinking, research and hard work involved hasn't been easy and, as always, our students and families have risen to the occasion.

The home learning task will culminate in our **whole school assembly and open afternoon on Wednesday 4th December**. Further details have gone home today to let you know what we have planned and we would love to see as many parents at school as possible on the day to celebrate such a massive whole-school project coming together.

## After school supervision

Following a couple of incidents in recent weeks, it is a good time to remind families of the arrangements that we have in place relating to supervision of students at the start and end of the day.

Currently school staff are on duty in the yard for fifteen minutes before and after school and provide **supervision from 8:45am to 9am and then from 3:30pm until 3:45pm**. If any children are at school unsupervised outside of these times, they will need to be booked into Before and After School care.

Currently many families remain in the school grounds (or in the playground or oval) after this point. Whilst we welcome this, it is important that parents keep a close eye on their children as, after 3:45pm they are no longer being supervised by the school staff.

## Italian Day

Later in the newsletter you will read about our amazing 'Italian day' last week. This wonderful day was made possible by an incredible amount of hard work from **Natalie Gallucci**, our Italian specialist teacher and **Betty Vassiliou**, our Kitchen Garden specialist. Alongside a small army of parent volunteers, they kept the day ticking along and made sure all of our students had a fun and educational time.

## Premier's Reading Challenge—certificates

Once again this year we have had an incredible response from our students taking part in the Premier's Reading Challenge with well over a hundred completing this annual event.

We will be joined by our State Member of Parliament **Martin Foley MP** at our school assembly on December 6th to hand out these certificates and again celebrate SKiPPS active involvement in the Challenge. Make sure you are here on time to see this presentation.

## Australian Mathematics Competition—certificates

In addition to our Premier's Reading Challenge participation, earlier in the year our school also provided students with the opportunity to enter the Australian Mathematics Competition.

We have handed out the certificates for this at assembly today for all of the 44 SKiPPS students who entered the competition and particularly recognising those students who achieved outstanding results. Ten of our students earned a Distinction Certificate for achieving results in the top 20% of students across Victoria. These students are;

One of our students **George R (3/4L)** earned a **high distinction** and achieved a result in the top 5% of students across the state.







## Deconstructed Guacamole of the Imagination

Season: Summer/Autumn

Serves: 30 tastes in the classroom  
or 6 serves at home

**Fresh from the garden:** avocados, coriander, corn kernels (optional) cucumber, garlic, limes, red capsicum (optional), red chilli (optional), red onion, spring onions (optional), tomatoes

**Recipe source:** Adapted with permission from a recipe by Anna Gare's *Eat In* (Murdoch Books 2013)

This recipe keeps the avocado a little chunky instead of mashing it, and uses red onion and cucumber for a bit of extra crunch. Choose a selection (or all!) of the extra ingredients from the suggestions list to create your own guacamole sensation!

### Equipment:

clean tea towel  
chopping board  
cook's knife  
metric measuring scales,  
jug and spoons  
whisk  
2 bowls – 1 medium,  
1 large  
mixing spoon  
serving bowls

### Ingredients:

#### For the guacamole:

1 large cucumber, diced  
4 large tomatoes, de-seeded  
and diced  
1 small red onion, finely chopped  
3 large avocados, peeled, de-stoned  
and diced  
1 large handful of coriander, leaves  
and stems roughly chopped

#### Suggested extras:

1 red capsicum, de-seeded and  
finely diced  
1 long red chilli, de-seeded and  
finely chopped  
1 x 200 g can kidney beans  
200 g corn kernels, grilled  
60 g low-fat sour cream  
4 spring onions, finely chopped

#### For the dressing:

60 ml lime juice  
60 ml extra-virgin olive oil  
2 garlic cloves, finely chopped  
1 tsp sea salt  
pinch of white sugar  
pinch of freshly ground black pepper,  
to taste





## Soft Taco Shells

Season: All

Makes: 30 tacos

### Equipment:

metric measuring cups  
and spoons  
large bowl  
wooden spoon  
plastic wrap  
rolling pin  
frying pan  
wide egg flip  
plate  
plastic bag



### Ingredients:

3<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cups plain flour  
(or corn masa flour for gluten-free tacos)  
2<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> tsp baking powder  
1 tsp salt  
1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cups warm water

### What to do:

1. Mix all dry ingredients together in the large bowl.
2. Gradually add enough warm water to form a crumbly dough, then work the dough with your hands until it holds together.
3. Tip the dough onto a clean surface and knead until smooth.
4. Divide the dough into 30 even pieces and shape them into small balls.
5. Cover the balls with plastic wrap and let them rest for 15 minutes.
6. Flatten each dough ball with your hand, then roll it from the centre to its edges until it is 3 mm thick.
7. Heat the frying pan on medium-to-high heat.
8. Add one taco at a time to the pan (no oil needed). Almost immediately, blisters should appear on the top.
9. Turn the taco over and press down all over with the egg flip.
10. Turn the taco again and press down on the other side until the blisters turn golden brown.
11. Stack the tacos as they cook on a plate inside a plastic bag. Keep the bag closed to steam before serving with Chilli 'Non' Carne (page 123).





## Corn Salsa

**Season:** Summer/Autumn

**Type:** Dips

**Difficulty:** Easy

**Serves:** 30 tastes in the classroom  
or 6 serves at home

**Fresh from the garden:** coriander, corn, green capsicum,  
red capsicum, spring onion

**Recipe Source:** Stephanie Alexander Kitchen Garden Foundation

This is such an easy recipe but such a tasty dish! You can use it as a dip alongside flatbread wedges, or as a sauce on steamed vegetables – what else could you have it with?

### Equipment:

tea towel  
chopping board  
kitchen knife  
metric measuring spoons  
frying pan with lid  
wooden spoon

### Ingredients:

1 green capsicum  
1 red capsicum  
4 corn cobs  
2 spring onions  
1 teaspoon cumin seeds  
½ teaspoon coriander powder  
tablespoon extra virgin olive oil  
salt  
pepper  
handful fresh coriander

### What to do:

- Slice the 2 capsicums finely.
- Carefully slice the corn kernels from the cob.
- Slice the spring onions into long lengths.
- Dry-fry the cumin and coriander seeds for 1 minute, then add the oil.
- Add the onion and capsicum and fry for 5 minutes.
- Add and stir through the corn kernels, cover with the lid and cook for 5–7 minutes. Then take off the heat and leave, covered, to steam for a few minutes.
- Taste for seasoning, adding salt and pepper if necessary.
- Tear up the coriander and sprinkle over the dip before serving.


